PLEASE NOTE: Completed entry forms must be given to Aldermaston Stores, by 6.00 pm on Wednesday 30th August 2017. Or you can choose to enter online where entries have an extended deadline of 6pm Thursday 31st August 2017

All exhibits must be staged between 8.00 am and 11.30 am on the morning of the Show.

NB: Food entries must have transparent coverings. All food entries should be cold when judged. Cakes etc., should be displayed on a plate with a doily. No fresh cream can be used. All jars and bottles must be free from all commercial trade marks and also clean and unblemished. Jars of jam, jellies, marmalade and pickles must have labels, which must be neat and straight, and state contents, month and year of making.

Photographs will be judged on technical correctness, subject matter, content, creativity and composition. Craft entries will be judged on skill, ingenuity, use of colour(s), choice of materials.

59. Design then sew or knit a tea cosy – a minimum size of a “pot for two”. Can be displayed on a teapot if wished or otherwise padded out
60. Create a car inspired poster based on the style of the 1940s
61. A beaded item of jewellery in red or white or blue or any combination of those colours, the design can include metallic beads

HEMECRAFT

Prizes: 1st £2.00, 2nd £1.00, 3rd 50p

71. A jar of soft fruit jam
72. A jar of fruit curd
73. A jar of pickles (a relish consisting of vegetables preserved in vinegar)
74. Wartime Carrot Cake, using the following recipe (it’s very nice we tested it, twice)
- 225g/8oz self-raising flour or, (as they did in the war, plain flour with 2 tsp baking powder)*
- 115g/4 oz margarine or cooking fat*
- 115g/4 oz caster or soft brown sugar or type available*
- 50g/2 oz sultanas or other dried fruit*
- 85g/3 oz carrots, grated*
- 1½ tbsp malt vinegar*
- Approx. 6½ tbsp milk*

Preheat oven to 180°C/350°F/Gas Mark 4/170°C with a fan oven, if using a fan oven please adjust baking time. Grease and flour an 18cm/7” cake tin.

Sift the flour into a mixing bowl. Rub in the margarine or fat, add the sugar, fruit and carrots. Mix the vinegar with the milk then add to the other ingredients to give a sticky consistency. Spoon into the cake tin and bake for 1 hour 10 minutes or until firm.

75. A fruit tart or flan using stone fruits, eg plums, apricots, cherries, peaches
76. Herb bread in a 2lb cake tin
77. Bakewell tart, using the following recipe:

*175g/6 oz shortcrust pastry
 2 tbsp jam or lemon curd
 75g/3 oz margarine
 75g/3 oz caster sugar
 100g/4 oz ground almonds
 50g/2 oz ground rice
 1 medium egg, beaten
 Few drops of almond essence (optional)
 Blanched almonds*

Preheat oven to 190°C/375°F/Gas Mark 5. Using an 18cm/7" round flan tin.

Line the tin with two thirds of the pastry, reserving the remainder for the top. Spread the base with jam or lemon curd. Cream the margarine and sugar. Mix together the ground almonds and ground rice, add to the creamed mixture alternately with the beaten egg. Spread the mixture over the jam or curd, then decorate with a lattice of pastry strips and blanched almonds. Bake for about 35-40 minutes.

80. Five coconut ice pieces
81. Three fruit muffins, same type
82. Homemade humous (any flavour can be entered but state on a label what that flavour is)
83. Fruit cake **for the Jenny Franklin Cup**
84. 1940s Jam cake using the following recipe (we tested this as well and it's nice):

*115g/4 oz boiled old potatoes
 225g/8 oz self-raising flour or (as they did in the war, plain flour with 2 tsp of baking powder)
 1 level tsp bicarbonate of soda
 1 tsp mixed spice
 50g/2 oz lard or margarine
 3 tbsp of jam
 2 fresh eggs (or if you'd like to try out wartime reconstituted dried eggs then please do)
 50g/2 oz currants or sultanas*

Preheat the oven to 180°C/350°F/Gas Mark 4/170°C with a fan oven, if using fan please adjust baking time. Grease and flour a 18cm/7" round cake tin.

*Sieve the potatoes; sift all the dry ingredients together. Rub the lard or margarine into the flour mixture. Add the potatoes, jam, well-beaten eggs and currants or sultanas. Spoon into the cake tin and bake for 50 minutes or until firm (our tester's cake took much less time so best to check after around 30 minutes). Turn out onto a wire cooling tray. **Variation:** add 50g/2 oz sugar and 1 tbsp of jam to the mixture. Apricot jam is particularly suitable.*

92. Make a creature from natural materials

93. Make a castle out of household boxes (eg: egg, tissue, cereal, kitchen roll tubes)

94. Write a short piece about something you love, with a small illustration that’s in keeping with the theme

MIDDLE DIVISION - open to competitors from 6 to 10 years on 1st September 2017

95. Make a garden in a seed tray **for the Peter Tull Cup** – can be traditional or futuristic in style
96. Make a monster out of vegetables
97. Make 7 coconut squish cakes, using the recipe: 200g desiccated coconut (1 packet), 397g condensed milk (1 can), chocolate sprinkles or any other toppings to decorate – this makes a lot of squish cakes. Mix the coconut and condensed milk together, keep adding coconut until you get a dough-like mixture, roll into small balls, put the balls into cupcake/sweet cases, then decorate to wow. Then put in the fridge to harden for half an hour
98. Colour in, using different pens and pencils, etc (an A4 pattern will be available from your school, our website or The Aldermaston Stores) a picture of The Old Mill
99. Make a sock puppet

JUNIOR DIVISION - open to competitors under 6 years on 1st September 2017

100. Make a monster out of vegetables
101. Make 3 pom poms (any colour, any size, any material)
102. An arrangement of flowers in a jam jar
103. Grow mustard cress in a small fun container (you can colour or paint it), max of 5” x 5” (tip: sow 5 - 7 days before the show)

104. Create a 20 x 20cm (plus seam for stitching) patchwork piece. This can be in any material that can be sewn together, and can be decorated in any way, stitching, embroidery, fabric paint, applique, buttons, bows, felting, anything.

RULES FOR EXHIBITORS

Please also study the rules in the Schedules themselves, particularly at the top of page S2.

1. **Eligibility to exhibit.** Since 2008, we have made all competitions open to everyone (within the specified age groups where applicable).
2. All exhibits, except floral arrangements, must be the property of, and grown, made or painted by the exhibitors (but “grown by” includes owners of gardens where some part-time labour is employed).
3. Only one entry per person in any class is allowed.
4. The Committee reserves the right to refuse any entry.
5. The exhibits must be staged between 8.00 am and 11.30 am on the day of the Show itself and **no exhibits may be removed from the staging until 4.30 pm.**
6. Any prize may be withheld or modified if the relevant exhibits are considered to be undeserving of the prize offered.
7. In the event of a tie for any trophy the exhibitor gaining most first awards shall be the winner.
8. The decision of the judges shall be final as to the relative merits of the exhibits, and all decisions of the Committee shall be final in all other matters.
9. Any appeal must be delivered in writing to the Show Secretary, Clare Bruton or designated person, in the Marquee by 4.00 pm on the day of the Show, and protests must be accompanied by a deposit of 25p. This deposit will be returned should the protest be upheld.
10. Competitors who currently hold the Challenge cups are responsible for their good condition, and will be liable for their replacement in case of loss or damage.
11. The Junior Division is NOT open to:
 - i) winners of the Champion Challenge Cup;
 - ii) the winner of the Junior Championship Cup in the previous year;
12. Children’s entries are to be their own work. Parents and other older persons must not assist. Children’s entries must not be included on other people’s entry forms. A form must be completed by them or for them for any classes they wish to enter.

BANKSIAN MEDAL

The Banksian medal is awarded to the winner of the largest total amount of money in prizes in the whole of the horticultural classes at the show or the highest number of place points in the whole of the horticultural classes at the show. This does not include floral arrangements. **Any competitor who has won the Banksian medal in the last two years is not eligible to win this medal.** In the event that two competitors obtain equal scores then the award should go to the one who has taken the greatest number of first prizes unless he/she has previously won a Banksian medal and the other not.
