PLEASE NOTE: Completed entry forms must be given to Aldermaston Stores, by 6.00 pm on Wednesday 29th August 2018. Or you can choose to enter online where entries have an extended deadline of 6pm Thursday 30th August 2018.

All exhibits must be staged between 8.00 am and 11.30 am on the morning of the Show.

NB: Food entries must have transparent coverings. All food entries should be cold when judged. Cakes etc., should be displayed on a plate with a doily. No fresh cream can be used. All jars and bottles must be free from all commercial trade marks and also clean and unblemished. Jars of jam, jellies, marmalade and pickles must have labels, which must be neat and straight, and state contents, month and year of making.

Photographs will be judged on technical correctness, subject matter, content, creativity and composition. Craft entries will be judged on skill, ingenuity, use of colour(s), choice of materials.

OPEN DIVISION - Open to all

2. Vase of herbaceous perennial flowers (quality and variety)

CRAFT

57. An item you have crafted out of wood or wooden parts
58. Paint, in any media, a cricketing scene. It can be serious or humorous
59. Create a “cake” to display at the finest cricket afternoon tea. It can be in fabric, knit, crochet, applique or any crafting material. It should be a 3D model and look scrumptious
60. Create a poster to celebrate the 100th year anniversary of the end of World War 1
61. Make a hanging Christmas decoration using any item(s) coloured red, white and green (or combinations of). You can also use metallic and sparkly materials. These will displayed from a frame which will be set at 30 cm high from the table
62. Cricket match in a seed tray, using as many home-made items as possible, approx. size 355 x 215mm (14”x 8”)
63. Create a potato print with a repeating pattern based on cricket, it could be the colours (red, white and green), and/or bats, balls and bails; caps, hats and cups (trophies); or whatever cricket means to you
64. Ribbon flowers (using ribbons, fabrics or combinations of the two) make a minimum of 5 flowers and a maximum of 10 then cleverly display, a maximum display size of 38cm x 38cm

69. A table centre piece just using foliage. Table size 20" by 20"
70. Your take on "Cricket on the village green" – fresh flowers, not more than 30 x 30cm"

HOME CRAFT

Prizes: 1st £2.00, 2nd £1.00, 3rd 50p

71. A jar of fruit jam
72. A jar of marmalade
73. A jar of pickles (a relish consisting of vegetables preserved in vinegar)
74. Orange Drizzle Cake, using the following recipe :

175g unsalted butter, softened, plus extra for greasing
175g light brown soft sugar
2 large oranges, zest of both and about 4-5 tbsp juice
3 eggs beaten
175g plain flour
1 tsp baking powder
50g golden granulated sugar

Preheat oven to 180c or 160c fan of gas mark 4. Grease a 900g loaf tin and line with parchment.

Beat the butter and brown sugar until light and fluffy. Beat in the zest of 1 orange. Slowly beat the eggs into the butter. Fold in the flour and baking powder until just smooth then stir in 1 tbsp orange juice. Pour into the tin and bake for 45-55 minutes, until golden and a skewer in the centre comes out clean.

Once out of the oven pierce the top all over with a skewer. Mix the rest of the orange juice and zest with the sugar and spoon all over the top. Cool completely in the tin before removing and serving.

75. A fruit tart or flan using any fruit(s)
76. A savoury bread in a 2lb cake tin (add a label to describe what the flavour is)
77. Chocolate fudge brownies, using the following recipe:

200 gm dark chocolate, chopped
175 gm unsalted butter
325 gm light brown soft sugar
130 gm plain flour
3 eggs

Pre-heat the oven to 170 degrees centigrade. 20 x 20 cm baking tin, lined with greaseproof paper.

Melt the chocolate along with the butter in a heatproof bowl over a saucepan of boiling water, ensuring the bowl does not touch the water. Stir in the sugar and stir this in well. Add the flour, then mix in the eggs one by one and beat until smooth and glossy.

Pour the mixture into the prepared tin and bake in the oven for approx 30 mins. They will be done when the surface of the brownie has cracked a little. Once cool they will have continued to firm up, so don't be afraid to take them out of the oven even if they are still a little 'wobbly'. Be careful not to overcook as the edges will become too chewy. Cut into 16 pieces. **You need to enter 4 of the 16 brownies you have made.**

79. Three Cheese scones
80. Savoury vegetable tartlet
81. Three fruit muffins, same type
82. Chocolate chip cookies
83. Fruit cake for the Jenny Franklin Cup
84. Lemon and stem ginger scones, using the following recipe:

225g self-raising flour, plus extra for dusting
2 tbsp caster sugar
½ tsp salt
55g unsalted butter, cubed and chilled
1 lemon, zest and 1 tbsp juice
2 tbsp chopped stem ginger
125ml whole milk, plus extra for brushing

Preheat the oven to 200°C, gas mark 6. Mix the flour, sugar and salt in a large bowl. Add the butter and, using your fingers, work in until it reaches a breadcrumb consistency. Stir in the lemon zest and make a well in the centre.

Mix the stem ginger and lemon juice into the milk. Pour into the flour mixture and, using a knife, roughly bring together. Knead briefly and lightly to combine, then pat out on a surface to about 2cm thick. Cut out 6cm rounds using a pastry cutter – you should make 6, re-rolling any trimmings.

Put on a lightly floured baking tray; brush with milk. Bake for 18-20 minutes, until golden; cool. **You need to enter 4 of the 6 scones you have made.**

RULES FOR EXHIBITORS

Please also study the rules in the Schedules themselves, particularly at the top of page S2.

1. Eligibility to exhibit. Since 2008, we have made all competitions open to everyone (within the specified age groups where applicable).
2. All exhibits, except floral arrangements, must be the property of, and grown, made or painted by the exhibitors (but “grown by” includes owners of gardens where some part-time labour is employed).
3. Only one entry per person in any class is allowed.
4. T4. The Committee reserves the right to refuse any entry.
5. The exhibits must be staged between 8.00 am and 11.30 am on the day of the Show itself and no exhibits may be removed from the staging until 4.30 pm.
6. Any prize may be withheld or modified if the relevant exhibits are considered to be undeserving of the prize offered.
7. In the event of a tie for any trophy the exhibitor gaining most first awards shall be the winner.
8. The decision of the judges shall be final as to the relative merits of the exhibits, and all decisions of the Committee shall be final in all other matters.
other matters.
9. Any appeal **must** be delivered in writing to the Show Secretary, Clare Bruton or designated person, in the Marquee by 4.00 pm on the day of the Show, and protests must be accompanied by a deposit of 25p. This deposit will be returned should the protest be upheld.
10. Competitors who currently hold the Challenge cups are responsible for their good condition, and will be liable for their replacement in case of loss or damage.
11. The Junior Division is NOT open to:
 - i) winners of the Champion Challenge Cup;
 - ii) the winner of the Junior Championship Cup in the previous year;
12. Children’s entries are to be their own work. Parents and other older persons must not assist. Children’s entries must not be included on other people’s entry forms. A form must be completed by them or for them for any classes they wish to enter.

BANKSIAN MEDAL

The Banksian medal is awarded to the winner of the largest total amount of money in prizes in the whole of the horticultural classes at the show or the highest number of place points in the whole of the horticultural classes at the show. This does not include floral arrangements. **Any competitor who has won the Banksian medal in the last two years is not eligible to win this medal.** In the event that two competitors obtain equal scores then the award should go to the one who has taken the greatest number of first prizes unless he/she has previously won a Banksian medal and the other not.
